In our last Musings, I sent out a request for a volunteer to take responsibility for producing our Town Report. I am happy to report that Eric Fiegenbaum has graciously consented to assume this responsibility. Many thanks to Eric, who already does so much for the town.

When Hurricane Irene came to visit, our volunteer fire fighters and part-time police officers were actively monitoring the situation and were prepared to respond to any issues caused by the hurricane. Arthur Hartford and his

crew were busy throughout the storm keeping the roads in town clear and passable. Our thanks to all of these dedicated people. They keep us safe and secure, and we truly appreciate their efforts.

Our thanks to Dan Gordon and Landcare for assuming responsibility for maintaining the Public Safety Complex landscaping. This is a great help to the town. We have wonderful volunteers who maintain the Town Hall and the cemetery, the small parks and the library plantings, but there are few volunteers and a lot of

planted areas! In taking responsibility for the area around the Safety Complex, Landcare has assured that this area will continue to be well-maintained and a source of pride for the community.

When the last tax bills were sent out, a survey was included regarding electronic payment of property taxes, motor vehicle registrations, and dog licenses. There were 126 responses to this survey. While there were some who favored adding an electronic payment option, the overwhelm-

MADBURY TRANSFER STATION will close for the season on Saturday, November 19.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE will be in effect on November 1 and will remain in place until April 1. It prohibits parking on streets and roads during snow plowing and removal operations. Any vehicle parked will be towed at the owner's expense. Placing of snow in the town road right of way during personal snow removal is prohibited as well. Your cooperation will help keep the roadways open and safe for all travelers.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE

Did you know there are many miles of walking/jogging trails throughout the town of Madbury? Some are grass surface trails that are kept mowed and some are natural cut trails through wooded areas. The trails behind town hall lead over to the Kingman Farm trails and are quite extensive. There is a trail map located behind town hall as well as on the Town Website under the Conservation Commission tab. Another trail system, which is less known about, winds through the Tibbetts' property and Madbury Memorial Park near the Cemetery.

The Recreation Commission is planning the installation of a fitness trail system around the perimeter of the Tibbetts' playing fields. The trail will have various fitness stations for stretching and exercise combined with a walking/jogging trail. Madbury Historical Society

I first met Folksinger Jeff Warner when he was an Artist-in-Residence at the Maple Street School in Hopkinton. I was working at NHPTV and looking to feature an educator using innovative ways to reach students. I spent some time with Jeff in that 4th grade classroom as he engaged students in what he called the "oral literature" of early American Life. A folklorist and scholar from Portsmouth, Jeff literally brings the history and culture of rural America to life using humor, age old instruments and song. He likes to call it teaching the history of real people; the stories you won't find in the text books. Jeff uses the traditional music to connect people to the past. I can tell you first hand that the stories he shares and the music he features are long remembered.

Jeff has worked for museums up and down the East Coast including the Smithsonian and today is among the nation's foremost performer/interpreters of traditional music.

The Madbury Historical Society and the Madbury Public Library have teamed up with the NH Humanities Council to bring you Jeff Warner's presentation of "Banjoes, Bones, and Ballads", Tuesday, Nov., 8th, 7pm at the Town Hall. We hope you'll join us and bring the kids; it should be educational and entertaining.

By the way, The Madbury Historical Society is having our annual potluck dinner at 6pm preceding Jeff's presentation. All are welcome; just bring a food item of your choice.

Conservation Commission

When Helen and Wesley Brett moved their family from Durham to a small farm in Madbury back in 1946 it had a profound change. No longer did the children occupy free time by just inventing and playing games. There was important work to be done. Cows had to be milked and there was equipment to maintain. The tasks drove home the motivation behind the move - man is connected to the land and there are contributions to be made by all. It is interesting that this concern has regained prominence in our current time with movements that seek to highlight the connection between man and the land, and address questions of sustainability.

On a bright blustery October 5, 2011, the conservation community came together to mark the completion of the 100th conservation project to protect the Great Bay. Under the direction of the Great Bay Protection Partnership, the Brett's 54.6 acre farm on Gerrish Brook has been protected for future generations by a conservation easement. The Partnership, a diverse coalition of conservation organizations, federal and state agencies, worked through the Na-

ture Conservancy with Nick Brett, representing the family, to secure the easement.

The 53 acre easement prohibits subdivision and development of the property, and protects its natural resources and contributions to the integrity of the Great Bay. The property straddles 1,300 feet of Gerrish Brook, which drains to Johnson Creek and the Bay. The brook has a State designated Species of Concern, the red fin pickerel, and an occurrence of a State designated endangered plant species. Ed Robinson from NH Fish and Game highlighted the connection to the Great Bay by reminding the attendees that waterfowl seen on the Great Bay also depend on interior wetlands.

The Brett farm is just downstream from the town owned 37 acre Hoyt Pond Conservation/ Recreation Area. The whole area is valuable for its sedge meadows and active and inactive beaver flowages.

Funding for the easement came from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the US Fish and Wildlife Service's North American Wetlands Conservation Fund. The Nature Conservancy holds and will administer the conservation easement.
